



Type of Work for Assessment

You must make available for assessment sufficient examples of electrical work including EV, PV and EESS installations completed in the previous 12 months by the business. The work should be representative of the day-to-day activities of the business and comply with BS 7671 and relevant Building Regulations.

Domestic Installer - application assessment

- A consumer unit change on its own or minor works are not acceptable for an applicant assessment.
- The electrical work must be sufficient examples for the range and scope of work carried out (at the same site or can be across multiple sites) and must include at least 2 new substantial circuits (at the same site or can be across multiple sites).
- All work made available for assessment must have a completed Electrical Installation Certificate (EIC).
- See notes 1 and 3 below.

Approved Contractor - application assessment

- Businesses are required to show a minimum of 3 acceptable sites as part of their assessment. The electrical work must be sufficient examples for the range and scope of work carried out. However, at least one job must be a complete electrical installation incorporating at least two new circuits and accompanied with a completed Electrical Installation Certificate (EIC). Your assessor may look at one job in progress.
- One large site may be used providing it can be split into 3 sites, typically each with their own distribution boards/consumer units and corresponding final circuits, however this will be at your assessor's discretion.
- A consumer unit change can be used but only for one site.
- Electrical Installation Condition Report (EICR) may be suitable for one site.
- For Approved Contractor applicants who also apply for Electrical Competent Persons Scheme (NICEIC Domestic Installer Scheme), a sample of domestic installation work and relevant systems must be made available for assessment which must include at least 2 new substantial circuits (at the same site or can be across multiple sites).
- All work electrical installation work made available for assessment (excluding one job in progress) must have a completed Electrical Installation Certificate (EIC). Any energised circuits for the job in progress must be accompanied with relevant certification details and test results.
- Minor works is not acceptable for an applicant assessment unless applying for defined approval.
- See Notes 1, 2 and 4.

Domestic Installer - surveillance assessments

- Businesses are required to show a minimum of one site as part of their assessment. The electrical work must be a sufficient example for the range and scope of work carried out.
- All work made available for assessment must have a completed Electrical Installation Certificate (EIC).
- See notes 1 and 3.

Approved Contractor - surveillance assessments

- Businesses are required to make available a minimum of three sites as part of their assessment. The electrical work must be sufficient examples for the range and scope of work carried out. Your assessor may look at one job in progress.
- Each sample of electrical work offered for the electrotechnical assessment should include the installation of sufficient new or additional circuits to enable NICEIC to undertake a thorough assessment of their QS's knowledge, including knowledge of the electrical supply characteristics, earthing and bonding requirements and circuit design.
- Generally acceptable sites will be those requiring an Electrical Installation Certificate (EIC) e.g. full rewires, additions of new circuits and the like.
- All work made available for assessment (excluding one job in progress) must have relevant certification details and test results.
- See notes 1, 2, 4 and 5.

Note 1: If your business carries out electrical work in the EV, PV and EESS categories, samples of these type of work should be made available for assessment, if deemed appropriate by your assessor.

Note 2: Approved Contractor Scheme Business's: Defined Approval status may apply depending on the type of work and certification made available for assessment.

Note 3: The NICEIC Domestic Installer Scheme does not assess the businesses competence to be able to issue EICR's.

Note 5: If the business also holds certification for the Domestic Installer Scheme, then the requirements of the Domestic Installer – surveillance assessment also need to be met.

All work offered for assessment **must not**;

- Be work completed for or on behalf of another business
- Be certified or notified by another business
- Be work completed on your own premises unless an applicant assessment
